

The designer is constantly on the lookout for new ideas. Those employed by the best houses regularly visit Paris and other European cities in search of the novel and the attractive. Styles which have been created by high-class custom tailors for exclusive patrons are frequently drawn upon for new ideas by designers who are able to reproduce from memory, with substantial accuracy, details from costumes seen in the market, in the hotel lobbies, theaters, caffé, and elsewhere. A high degree of skill is sometimes shown by the designer in planning garments that can be cut out of the goods with a minimum waste of material. When garments are to be made in large quantities, and when low cost of production per unit is the important consideration, rather than style, it is necessary that the garments be capable of being put together by the tailor, or the operator at the machine, with a minimum of trouble. This means a lower manufacturing cost because of the lower piece rate for labor. The one thing that all manufacturers and designers strive for, however, is that elusive quality called style. Without this quality a garment may not bring \$10 in the market; with it, another...

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
